




Map of our Service Area



Our Membership Demographics





Geographical Areas Served

The Hornets' Nest Council, encompassing Mecklenburg, Cabarrus, Rowan, Anson, Union, Montgomery, Stanly counties in North Carolina, and York County in South Carolina, presents a diverse landscape in terms of youth development and well-being. Anson County, for instance, reported a median household income of \$29,849, with 23.9% of individuals under 18 living below the poverty line, highlighting economic challenges impacting youth. Focusing on the wellbeing of girls, these economic hardships can disproportionately affect their access to essential resources such as education and healthcare, potentially hindering their overall development and future opportunities. In Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, the child poverty rate stands at 14.9%, slightly below the state average of 17.6%. Notably, 7% of households are headed by single parents, mirroring the state average. Alarmingly, approximately 43% of teens reported experiencing prolonged periods of sadness or hopelessness, and 19% considered attempting suicide, indicating significant mental health challenges among youth. In Cabarrus County, 25.2% of individuals live below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, with certain tracts experiencing even higher rates. These socioeconomic factors, coupled with mental health concerns, disproportionately impact young girls, underscoring the need for targeted interventions to enhance their well-being and future prospects.

Service Pillars



Girl Scouts gain valuable STEM-related skills through programs focused on robotics and engineering, space and science, and nature and design. In robotics and engineering, they learn problem-solving, coding, and mechanical design, developing critical thinking and technical skills as they build and program robots. Through space and science badges, they explore topics like astronomy, physics, and earth science, fostering curiosity and hands-on experimentation. Nature and design programs teach them environmental awareness, sustainable practices, and how to apply creativity to solve real-world challenges in design and innovation. These experiences not only build technical expertise but also encourage teamwork, leadership, and resilience, empowering girls to pursue careers in STEM fields.





Outdoor Exploration

Outdoor exploration plays a crucial role in the development of Girl Scouts by fostering skills in leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving. Through activities like hiking, camping, and navigating nature, Girl Scouts build resilience, confidence, and independence while connecting with the natural world. These experiences encourage physical activity, environmental stewardship, and an appreciation for the outdoors. Outdoor challenges also help girls develop critical thinking and adaptability as they encounter new situations, overcome obstacles, and collaborate with peers. Overall, outdoor exploration enhances their personal growth, boosts self-esteem, and nurtures a lifelong love of nature and adventure.

Life Skills

Girl Scouts develop a wide range of life skills through their badge work, including practical abilities like cooking, car care, and health, as well as fostering a sense of citizenship. Cooking badges teach them meal planning, nutrition, and culinary techniques. Car care badges build knowledge of vehicle maintenance and safety. Health badges promote physical wellbeing, first aid, and mental health awareness. Citizenship badges encourage active participation in community service, leadership, and understanding civic responsibilities. Through these badges, **Girl Scouts gain confidence**, independence, and a strong foundation for lifelong learning and personal growth.









Girl Scouts develop entrepreneurial skills through hands-on experiences like the Girl Scout Cookie Program and Fall Product Program, where they learn goal setting, money management, customer service, and business ethics. They earn badges in business, marketing, and financial literacy while engaging in experiential learning, leadership training, and community-focused entrepreneurship. Through business pitch competitions and innovative projects, **they gain** confidence, problem-solving abilities, and real-world experience that prepares them for future careers and leadership roles.

Council-Curated Programming: Developing Skills for a Bright Future

The Girl Scouts Hornets' Nest Council remains committed to providing dynamic and enriching experiences that empower girls with essential skills for personal growth, academic success, and career readiness.

Through our council-curated programs, Girl Scouts engage in a variety of activities that nurture creativity, leadership, collaboration, and confidence, all while exploring diverse fields of interest.

From financial literacy and entrepreneurship in SheBiz to hands-on STEM innovation with DIY Speaker Box Build and Career STEM Panelist Night, our programs introduce girls to vital skills that pave the way for future success. Artistic expression thrives in sessions like Jewelry Making, Canvas Paint Night, Textile Artist(s), and Brushes & Bonds: Father-Daughter Paint Program, allowing girls to embrace their creativity and develop their artistic talents.

Technology-driven learning opportunities such as Intro to Canva, Canva Comic Strip, and Design with Purpose: Canva 1-on-1 equip girls with essential digital design and storytelling skills, enhancing their proficiency in modern communication tools. Our focus on higher education and career planning is evident through offerings like College Application Strategies for Girl Scouts and Let's Talk Historically Black Colleges and Universities, ensuring girls are well-prepared for their academic journeys.

Community and sisterhood are celebrated through events like Galentine's Sisterhood Day and S'Mores Day, reinforcing the importance of strong, supportive relationships. Language development and cultural awareness are fostered in Despierta Tu Español, while mental wellness takes center stage in Mental Health Awareness Month: Inside Out. Leadership and advocacy skills are strengthened through Empowered Voices – Conversation with Local, State, and Federal Dignitaries, where girls engage with influential leaders to inspire civic engagement.

Additionally, fun and skill-building activities like Ice Cream Making and Winter Wonderland provide opportunities for hands-on learning and festive joy. Through these diverse and engaging programs, Girl Scouts develop a broad range of competencies that prepare them to lead, innovate, and succeed in all aspects of life.







Our Properties


Our council maintains several properties across the area to provide the Girl Scout Leadership Experience to our members. At Camp Holly Hut in Rowan County, camping activities can be enjoyed year-round with six winterized cabins, allowing campers to enjoy the outdoors even in colder months. The bathhouse and fire rings, along with an open-air picnic shelter, provide a comfortable setting for outdoor enthusiasts. Similarly, the POD Village in Charlotte, with its five octagonal pods, provide an excellent setting for scouting activities, offering a variety of amenities including kitchens, bathrooms, and a games field with archery equipment, making it an ideal venue for troop overnights and first-time campers.

At the Dale Earnhardt Environmental Leadership Campus at Oak Springs, new developments in 2024 focused on enhancing the camp's waterfront and recreational areas. A modern dock was installed to improve safety and accessibility for water-based activities, such as canoeing, kayaking, and swimming, enriching the experience for campers. The addition of a new bathhouse adjacent to the sports fields further increased accessibility, reducing walk times for campers and making the area more convenient. **These improvements, along with the existing array of hiking trails, archery, and swimming opportunities, position the campus as an ideal location for outdoor exploration.**






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
